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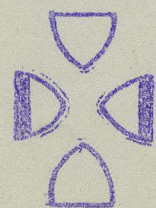

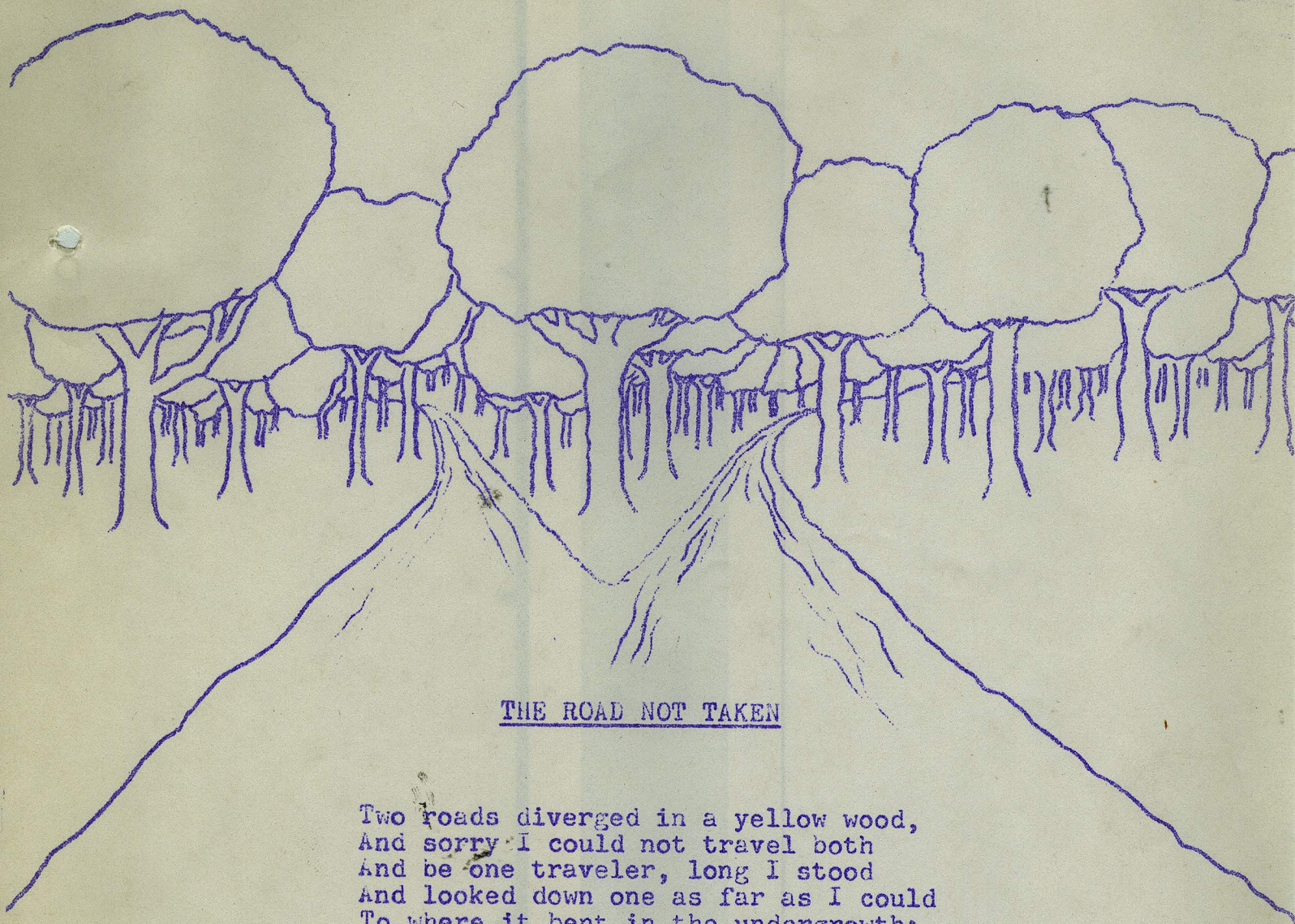

had worn them really about the same,

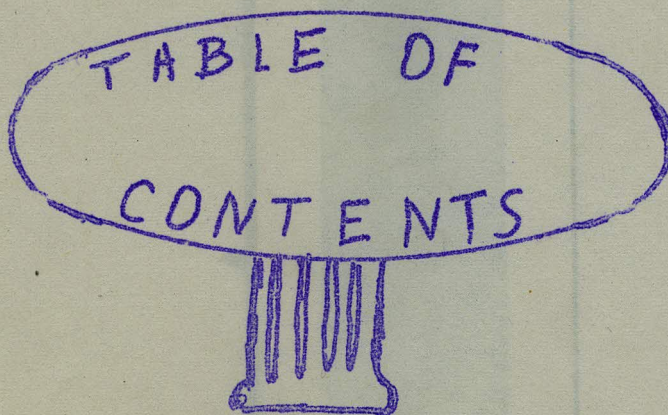
And both that morning equally lay

Math Club
